2025 Early Childhood Summit Planning

- Have decided to host in September
- Due East Partners will be our consultants to help with planning
- All are welcome to attend planning meetings
- Individuals/groups to include:

- MALMB and United Way will sponsor the summit to support statewide participation
- Utilize summit to determine priorities for the 2026 legislative session
- Topics to be covered:
 - o Workforce
 - o Reinstatement of certification funding through MSDE
- Next planning meeting will be hosted in Mid May

Childcare Audits at MSDE

- In 2023, MSDE required both email and mail submissions for scholarships. The current portal did not exist and pre-payments were beginning
- Integrity audits for 2023 are now in progress
 - Documentation from 2023 payments is now being required within 2 weeks
 - Centers did not receive notice
 - Documentation was submitted in 2023, but MSDE has no record of it
 - o If documentation can not be provided, then centers will be required to pay back the funding they were advanced
 - Mandate came directly from and MSDE email account that you cannot respond to
 - Phone number on the audit notice is no longer in service
 - No contact from a real person as of now
- Childcare centers reached out to media and news outlets due to lack of communication from MSDE regarding the audit
 - <u>WMAR Article</u> has been published and MSDE responded that they'd take a look internally and make contact with providers

Budget Cuts to Head Start and Early Head Start

Additional Discussion

- Article in the Baltimore Banner
 - The federal childcare center office in DC is no longer in existence
 - These were childcare centers inside of federal buildings to support federal workers
 - Most were chains, not privately owned or smaller centers
- What are childcare centers seeing?
 - Some see a full house plus a waiting list
 - o Federal workers who return to work are looking for child care
 - Others are seeing a slow down due to concern about finances, families are not able to sign a full school year contract
 - o There's a large demand for toddlers, but not for other age groups
- School system is taking on pre-k 4
 - There has been a sense of competition between public schools and community based public pre-k even though they are offering the same things
 - Will likely intensify as there are more publicly funded slots in public schools
 - o In mixed classrooms of 3 and 4 year olds, it will be challenging to fill a classroom
 - Those who are turning 4 will be sent to public school if the pre-k expansion is only for 3 year olds
 - o Private providers can still service Tier One 4-year olds, but it is now the parent's choice
 - Challenge is informing the public that education does not have to equate to public schools
- What behaviors are we seeing in young children?
 - Aggressive behaviors, children have had to be dismissed more than usual due to safety issues related to children's behavior
 - Elopement, throwing objects, destroying rooms, hitting peers and teachers
 - Seeing this behavior with ages 2 through 5
 - It has gotten better for Kingdom Kare; a few students were dismissed last year, but not much during this year
 - Teachers and staff have managed better this year, maybe due to increased pay
 - Why are we seeing these behaviors?
 - Can be a result of pandemic and trickle down stress of the adults in their lives
 - As a result, children's brains are laying pathways for chaos
 - Financial hardships for families also plays a factor
 - Normalized for parents
 - Parents seem hopeless and/or ignore behaviors
 - Parents are not available and do not know how to handle behaviors
 - O Is there an increase in nonverbal children?
 - There's been a rise in autism diagnoses recently
 - Some of it is from the social environment



- There are better ways of recognizing/diagnosing behaviors
- The spectrum of autism is very wide
- A lack of connection with caregiver plays a major role
 - Baby has to connect with a put together adult to become a put together adult
- Need to find a way to mitigate stress and trauma for parents to help their children
 - Parents feel burnt out, tired, irritable and detached
 - Parents also need connection to other parents, this was not readily available during the pandemic
 - Family support centers are vital to this
